International **Cultural Experience**

10 LU / 3 US / 5 ECTS credits

Develop an understanding of current issues and potential difficulties facing different communities in Britain. As well as lectures and seminars, you'll have the chance to experience Lancaster life through activities related to business, culture, social issues and political matters. Build international friendships on team-building social activities: deliver a talent show, visit London and compete in the College Cup Day!

Week 1:

Learn about British culture and society, and how these factors contribute to a diverse range of experiences in the workplace. You'll visit a local business in the region and learn about the associated social and economic impact of small to medium enterprises. You will take part in community experiences and also engage in problem-solving team challenges, where you will consider the importance of language and communication, especially in intercultural contexts.

Week 2:

This week you will learn how recent political changes have affected Britain. You will meet a local politician and debate key issues surrounding social change and the challenges facing the North West of England. You'll engage with local community organisations and take part in volunteering in support of social and environmental initiatives in the local area.

Week 3:

In the final week, a trip to London will inspire you to think about the diversity of British culture and differences between regions in England and urban/rural environments. You'll also have the opportunity to reflect on your experiences and present your work to your tutors and peers.

Assessment

This summer school will be assessed through three methods: 30%: Presentation 40%: Reflective report 30%: Written assessment



Film

15 LU / 4 US / 7.5 ECTS credits

Develop an understanding of the formal and technical composition of films and the wider conventions of cinema. You will learn to analyse films, develop short scripts, work with cameras and edit.

You will have a combination of lectures, screening and workshops to help you develop the theoretical knowledge that you will need to put into practice working on the project in week 3. The lectures provide you with an understanding of the formal and technical composition of films in order to allow you to undertake detailed analysis, from the level of close scrutiny of individual images, and their interrelation with the soundtrack, through to the narrative assembly of shots and scenes. Through the analysis of a range of examples, you will become familiar with the key formal and semantic conventions of cinema.

The practical workshops develop your skills to work with cameras and digital film equipment as well as developing post-production and editing skills. Every student is given the chance to write a short script following guidelines. Working in a group, students will select a script to pitch and produce. Students in a group all share the same mark for the completed film. In addition, you will write an essay to critically reflect on and analyse the production process, the formal and aesthetic decisions made and reflect on the completed film.



Week 1:

- Lecture: Cinematography and the shot, and mise-en-scène, plus a film screening
- · Seminar: Discussing the topic and the film
- Scriptwriting workshop
- Practical camera and sound workshop
- Post-production workshops

Week 2:

- Lecture: Editing and film sound, plus a film screening
- Seminar: Discussing the topic and the film
- · Lecture: Pre-production to production
- Practical camera and sound workshop
- Post-production workshops
- Pitching session and informative feedback on each project

Week 3

- One-to-one group meeting to finalise the plan for the film project
- Production and post-production of project
- Presentation of the completed work

Assessment

This summer school will be assessed through three methods:

40% Group film project

20% Group presentation

40% Individual essay

Environment and **Sustainability**

15 LU / 4 US / 7.5 ECTS credits

You will embark on a journey into our natural environment exploring a broad range of topics. Through a mixture of interactive lectures, practical laboratory sessions and field excursions, this course is perfectly designed to build your knowledge of our natural environment, and the human impacts on it – with a focus on innovations in sustainability.

Weeks 1 & 2

You will be introduced to the culture, lifestyle and the environment of the UK and explore:

- · Natural environments
- Ecology
- · Hydrology/flooding/water treatment
- Sustainability and circular economy
- · Soil/water/food security
- · Environmental pollution
- · GIS and Environmental Data Science

Week 3:

There will be a two-night trip to London to explore the capital.

You will also be preparing assessment materials and working on a team project under the theme of 'Understanding, Respecting and Managing the Environment', where you will develop a scientific approach to the study of environmental problems.

Assessment

This summer school will be assessed through three methods:

30%: Group project

10%: Group presentation on your environmental project

60%: Individual reflective essay (2,000 words plus figures, tables, references and appendices) submitted post programme



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International **Commercial Law**

15 LU / 4 US / 7.5 ECTS credits

Explore current issues in international commercial law and develop your understanding and knowledge of the underpinning methods, processes and concepts on this summer school. Primarily aimed at undergraduate law students you'll experience legal studies with both a basis in English law and legal methods, and a focus on international perspectives and issues.

In addition to the seminars, lectures and group work on campus, you'll also spend two nights in London, exploring and experiencing law in one of the global hubs of international commercial law.

Week 1:

Formation of Business

This topic introduces international commercial law by highlighting the concept of risk in business/commercial activities, providing a brief history of commercial law, discussing various business vehicles as well as the concepts and implications of separate legal personality and limited liability.

Week 2:

Management of Business

Exploring key issues in the trading phase of a commercial enterprise, you'll consider the importance of finance/capital to commercial activities and how that finance is procured, discussing key concepts like security, guarantees, retention of title and receivables financing. Finally, you'll consider options for resolving international commercial disputes, with the focus on globally-used measures of arbitration.

Week 3:

Insolvency and Commercial Transactions

You'll explore the notion of insolvency as a pervasive issue in international commercial law. It will highlight the impact of insolvency on commercial activity as well as the twin ideals of insolvency regimes to facilitate the restructuring/rescue of an insolvent entity or to procure a sensible distribution of available assets to creditors. Finally, the future of insolvency and other commercial law regimes in light of Brexit will be considered.

Assessment

This summer school will be assessed through two methods:

75%: Essay

25%: Presentations which will be delivered across the three weeks on specific themes



Introduction to **Law**

15 LU / 4 US / 7.5 ECTS credits

This summer school will provide you with an opportunity to explore current legal issues and develop your awareness and understanding of the methods, processes and concepts that underpin university-level legal studies. This programme is aimed at providing undergraduates with a first experience of studying law, and may be particularly useful for those interested in studying law at postgraduate level.

You'll experience lectures, seminars and group work on campus, field trips to help you connect the issues and concepts to the practice and operation of law, plus travel to London to make visits to significant law organisations.

Week 1:

You will explore issues and concepts that are fundamental to our understanding of law and legal processes. Lectures will introduce the issues and concepts, explain their significance and the context in which they operate and develop. You will then have an opportunity to discuss and explore the issues further in seminars as well as develop your analytical and legal reasoning skills in masterclasses. You will also begin to work in a team, engaging in group exercises during the workshops.

Week 2 & 3:

You will explore contemporary issues and themes concerning the role and impact of law in selected key areas – criminal law, human rights law and civil law.

Skills masterclasses will give you a grounding in legal research and writing skills. In the workshops, you will work more independently in teams on exercises arising out of the lectures and seminars.

A trip to London, including visits to leading legal institutions and international legal experts, will help to reinforce the excitement, challenges and importance of law in the modern world. You will also start to prepare for your essay assignments and carry out the last of the group exercises, as we pull together the insights, implications and issues that have emerged during the summer school.

Assessment

This summer school will be assessed through two methods:

60%: Essay exploring one designated theme in depth

40%: Presentations which will be delivered across the three weeks on specific themes





War and **Diplomacy**

15LU / 4US / 7.5FCTS credits

Explore the role played by individual, state and other actors in war and diplomacy in the specific learning environment provided by Lancaster's Centre for War & Diplomacy (CWD). As well as class seminars and workshops, you will have the opportunity to test thinking with colleagues from across the world. There is flexibility in the curriculum to allow for student-driven deeper explorations of subjects. Naturally, this will reflect the actual composition of the classes. There will also be a visit to the heart of UK government in Westminster.

Week 1:

A series of deliberately wide-ranging opening sessions exploring the interwoven themes of war and diplomacy. The focus, as with the remainder of the course, will be on relatively contemporary history examples, but with glances into the deeper past in the context of analysing and understanding the morality of war and the philosophical underpinnings of rights and diplomacy.

Consideration of ways of studying war and diplomacy; how does diplomacy fail or wars succeed; Complexity and the narratives and manipulations of war; Identity, religion, resources, and sectarianism.

Week 2:

War as a subject of history, the emergence (and re-emergence) of the nation state, globalisation, international bodies/supranational diplomacy; Freedom and Terror: the international consensus (or absence thereof) on constraints and action; The morality of war, and what does peace look like?




Week 3:

The history of diplomacy. Nuclear and environmental diplomacy; Failures of diplomacy – individual, national and supranational, NATO, BRICS, etc.; Conflicts in the contemporary arena and their witnessing and morality; The changing character of war – remoteness/proximity; the "diplomacy" of War Crimes.

Assessment

This summer school will be assessed through two methods:

- + 80%: Policy brief (2,000-2,500 words)
- +20%: Presentation

Support and wellbeing



Summer School Fees

Summer School fees consist of tuition and accommodation costs. The tuition fees are:

- 10 Lancaster credits / 3 US / 5 ECTS £1,273
- 15 Lancaster credits / 4 US / 7.5 ECTS £1,911
- The catered accommodation fee for 3 weeks is £1.444

The accommodation fees include a catered ensuite single room on campus, or an approved room off campus, with most meals provided during the summer schools. Meals are not provided when away from campus during scheduled overnight trips. If you are staying away from Lancaster University as part of the scheduled programme, then the accommodation facilities will vary.
